## **Title II Report on the Quality of Teacher Preparation 2006-2007**

### **What is Title II?**

Congress enacted Title II of the Higher Education Act (HEA) in October 1998 in order to improve the quality of teaching and inform the public about teacher preparation. Section 207 of Title II requires the annual preparation and submission of reports on teacher preparation and licensing: one from institutions to states, a second from states to the U.S. Secretary of education, and a third from the Secretary to Congress and the public. The first report from institutions of higher education was due to the state department of education on April 7, 2001. (U.S. Department of Education, National Center for Educational Statistics. April 19, 2000. *Reference and Reporting Guide for Preparing State and Institutional Reports on the Quality of Teacher Preparation: Title II, Higher Education Act*, NCES 2000-089. Washington, DC).

### **What is included in a Title II report?**

Institutions of higher education must include data about pass rates on tests of educator licensure. Other data is collected including numbers of students enrolled in licensure programs, average number of hours per week of student teaching, and number of faculty supervising student teachers.

### **Are Institutions of Higher Education Required to Publish Title II Information?**

Institutions of Higher Education are required to publish pass rates and other required data through their publications and promotional materials.

### **About Bay Path College**

### **Strengths of the Bay Path College Education Program**

- Classes are small and personal.
- All students major in liberal studies. This major strengthens the content areas for teaching.
- The programs are offered during the traditional semester format, or through a one-day Saturday format for non-traditional women (women over the age of twenty-three).

- The Bay Path College Preschool on the Longmeadow campus, a laboratory school, supports observational and field opportunities for students in education, psychology and occupational therapy.
- Bay Path College maintains close relationships with a variety of elementary schools, preschools and childcare centers surrounding the three campuses.
- The *Excellence in Teaching Resource Center* located in the Hatch Library houses a multitude of curriculum guides, educational resource materials and children's books, all of which support the education programs.
- Students take education courses early in their college experience, thus allowing them to determine if they have made a viable career choice.
- Students participate in observations and field experiences in a variety of schools and grade levels throughout their college experience.
- Students participate in a semester of supervised pre-practicum prior to entering practicum (student teaching.)
- Teachers are selected and screened by college faculty to ensure the best possible placement for Bay Path education students.
- The college has developed review sessions to help students prepare for the Communication and Literacy component of the Massachusetts Tests of Educator Licensure.

#### **Bay Path College Pass Rates on the Massachusetts Tests of Educator Licensure (MTEL) 2006-2007**

Pass rates are based on the 2006-2007 cohort of students who completed their licensure requirements during that year. These students are designated as *program completers*.

**Number of Program Completers = 31**

**Pass Rate on the MTEL = 100%**

#### **Bay Path College Education Program Information Required by Title II, 2006-2007**

- Number of students enrolled in all educator preparation programs: 89
- Number of students seeking the first initial license: 89
- Number of students who were enrolled in programs of supervised student teaching: 31
- Number of supervising faculty: 7
- Average number of hours/week required in student teaching: 32.5
- Average number of week required for student teaching: 12

**The Massachusetts Department of Education fully approved the early childhood and elementary education programs at Bay Path College through December 2008. Our 100% pass rate on the MTEL places our graduates among the top teacher education program graduates in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.**
